During the 2023-2024 school year, Yspaniola had a preschool enrollment of 43 students between the ages of 3-6, and this year, we have seen that number grow to 51. We are proud of successfully incorporating the Montessori philosophy into our preschool program, promoting curiosity and autonomous learning.



Literacy Program in Batey Libertad

In the 2023-2024 school year, our Batey Libertad Learning Center had 32 students in three different classes: Introduction to Reading, Basic Reading, and Reading and Grammar.


Average reading levels per class




Literacy Program in Los Mina Sur



Building Bonds of Friendship with B3

The visits from volunteers and students, particularly the cultural exchange which defines these visits, is incredibly impactful for both the participants and the members of the Batey Libertad community. This year, thanks to the support of Builders Beyond Borders (B3), a group of volunteer high school students were able to build toilets in the garden where our new Montessori preschool operates.

For 10 days, the host mothers of Batey Libertad prepared meals and beds for the volunteers. Furthermore, many young people from the Batey joined the construction efforts. The teamwork of the community and B3 was essential to completing this project effectively.



To do so, the children learned how to care for the new community gardens, participated in the Environmental Sanitation Day, and did readings and other activities related to the topic.


